From Ann Frakes' Scrapbook: News was received here that Brother John W. Goldman, who has served the church here as pastor and was known by most everyone in this locality died last Thursday and was laid to rest in the Bethany cemetery near where most of his life was spent, last Friday. His health has been failing for several months and his last sermon was preached about two months ago at a church where he has been serving for some time. He was one of the leading ministers in his day and some of his work here will never be forgotten. The writer was one of the many who heeded the call of the Master as it came in a message by Brother Goldman and became members of the church under his ministry. The church here flourished and grew under his care and as the years came and went they left their weight, but he labored on in the vineyard where he long had labored, until called to rest.

I-3-6-2-8 Olive Idora Esarey, born Aug. 19, 1878, Branchville; married James Gibson Aug. 12, 1894 at Branchville, Ind., he was a son of William and Malinda Shields Gibson, brother of Thomas Jefferson Gibson who married Malissa Frakes (I-3-4-2-4). James Gibson died of smallpox Apr. 13, 1903 after taking care of his brother, James and Dora lived until Nov. 1896 on the part of her father's farm now owned by William Guillaume (I-3-6-2-7-2). They had 4 children, three born on the farm; one mile from Branchville; Dora married Jesse King, son of Henry and Miranda Figgins King and lived on a farm four miles east of Branchville. She died Mar. 1, 1938 at Keensburg, Ill. 4 ch: Emma Evelyn, Carrie Antoinette, Loren Roscoe and James Victor. Rovilla Gibson, a sister to James and Thomas Jefferson Gibson married a Robertson and lived at Sulphur.

From Deward C. and Ruby Y. Williams: Bradley Gibson Jenkins and allied Families just before page I: "One of the earliest colonists bearing this old family name to come to our shores was John Gibson, one of the early Virginia settlers in 1635. It also appears that one of his descendants, another John Gibson of Orange County, North Carolina, was a soldier of the American Revolution." The ancestors of these Branchville Gibsons according to the family tree in the above mentioned book are: John Gibson born Cumberland County who married Sarah McDowell May 15, 1731 and William Perkins who married Rosean or Rosannah. The children of these four parents: Johnson M. Gibson born 1783 died 1834 married (1) in 1815 and (2) the mother of this line, Temy Perkins born 1802 in Ohio and died July 1876. The son of these William T. Gibson, born Apr. 6, 1825, died Feb. 3, 1894, married Mar. 18, 1849 Malinda Frances Shields who was born Mar. 13, 1832 and died Mar. 22, 1893. Malinda Frances' parents were Isaac Ward Shields born 1810 Kentucky; and Bethania Mitchell born 1809 in Ky. James and Thomas Jefferson Gibson were sons of this union.

Ibid: p. 41: Johnson McDowell Gibson was probably born in Virginia. His father bought land on Plum Creek, a branch of New River in Montgomery County, Va. when Johnson was 13. When he was 25 he volunteered for the War of 1812. His application for pension is SC 3338 dated Crawford Co., Ind. Dec. 11, 1850. He was married in Meade County, Ky. Johnson's first wife Sally Penco and his father died soon after the war and Johnson married Temperance Ann Perkins aged about 22 years. About 1829 or 30 they crossed the Ohio River at Brandenburg into Harrison County, Indiana. He bought land in Crawford Co. Johnson McDowell Gibson is said to have lived to be 107 to 110 years old even 116. His pension papers show he was born about 1788. William T. son of Johnson McDowell Gibson and Temperance Ann Perkins was born in Meade Co., Ky. He married a girl born at Hannibal, Mo. William and Malinda lived in a big double log house with an old fashioned well in the front yard and a fireplace in the center. Malinda died as the Sleeping Beauty from pricking her finger with a needle while sewing. Her ninth child, James Victor Marshal Burton Gibson was born in Nov., 1875. He and Dora first settled near Princeton, then near Mt. Carmel, Ill. After 1900 they returned to Branchville and bought an 125 acre farm a mile south of Branchville which lay along that part of Oil Creek known as the Old Reily Hole. It was in 1903 that James Gibson gave his life for

This writer (Myra Esarey Evans) can remember, a child of three, sitting in a chair in the window with smallpox vaccination, too sick to go to a baseball game, the awe in the voices of my parents as they would mention Jim who gave his life for Jeff; and that if they had known (what they know now) they would not have painted Jim's body with whatever they used to stop the itching -- that they should have left salt out of the diet. I am not sure just what I remember from being three and hearing it discussed all the years of my life; for my father and mother always rated Jim Gibson the greatest hero in the world.

She married June 11, 1917, Floyd Mason Cunningham, born Feb. 24, 1892 at Cannelton. He graduated from Ball State with a B. S. and from Indiana State Teachers' College with a master's degree. He taught for 35 years in Perry, Wayne and Hamilton Counties, Indiana. He was a veteran of World War I. He died at Arcadia, Ind. Oct. 22, 1962. 2 ch: Evelyn Jeanne and Patricia Ann.

Letter of Carrie's Christmas 1958: I never cease to be thankful for this job. I know of no more rewarding thing than working with teachers and children and supplying them with good books...My brother Loren tells me that in the old days in the Hills of Indiana in Perry County, my sister and I were the school librarians. I had forgotten it but never will I forget the wonderful books we had there. It was unusual I believe, for a school to have such a good library. It wasn't the number of volumes but the quality that was outstanding. Such selections spoke volumes for the teachers who selected them for those shelves. Another source of association with books was through good old Uncle Sol. Any birthday, holiday, or visit was certain to bring a bundle of books from him. I wish he could know how happy he made us. Then the most precious pictures of our home are the evenings after supper, all of us circling the oil lights on the table, each of us with a book or better still listening to one or the other of us reading aloud. ...The family is near enough that we can get together a couple of times a year. Clark, Norma and Mark, Duane and Lynne are at Minier near Peoria. This is his 5th year of Vo-Ag teaching. Last summer they took a trip back to Riverside, California to visit her folks. Kermit's could hardly ask for a better situation as he is only eight miles out from Urbana, at St. Joseph and is Vo-ag teacher there. It is good land, good people, good churches and good schools. Gail is finishing grade school this year. I hear she is cheer leader and enjoying the activities. Dwight Bonnie with Ricky and Pamela live 18 miles west of here. He finds being a Farm Planner in U. S. Soil Conservation Department a full time job. Wayne county is very large and he scoots all over it here and there and yonder pretty much. She won her laurels on the word capitol; her opponent spelled it capital, it being explained by the pronouncer that the word defined meant the state building where laws are framed.
